She has spent time as both a detective and in uniform roles – working in areas of response, safeguarding, intelligence and investigating crime – the latter as part of a team based in Market Harborough.

# Lutterworth will have a new police base

A few weeks ago, I met up with Cllr Rosita Page to see what we could do about the closure of Lutterworth Police Station in my predecessor's term. Lutterworth is getting bigger all the time, and there is clearly a need for a police base in the town. I am determined that monies received from the developments, in the form



of Section 106 funding payments, will be used to Lutterworth's benefit.

So, I have insisted that a new police base must be created, with facilities for local officers, meeting rooms, and

hopefully a big blue lamp! It will undoubtedly increase officer visibility in the area and provide a much-needed base for the increased number of police and support staff that the area will need.

The long-awaited return of the County Show came with a bang – the first day was nearly a washout with torrential rain and the odd bout of thunder.

The second day, when the sun came out to play, was a great success. Scores of people came onto our stand to talk about funding, grants, commissioned services and to find out what I can do for them.

# Tackling problems in Broughton Astley

On a recent visit to Broughton Astley, I met up with members of the parish council and with county councillor Neil Bannister to visit some of the trouble spots for vandalism and ASB to try to find a way forward.

I was pretty horrified to find broken glass, litter bins that had been set on fire and general vandalism at several places. However, I was pleased to find that there has been a good response from the Neighbourhood team in respect of increased patrols and talking to young people. I also visited the allotments to

talk to allotment holders about shed break ins – and while there planted a tree as part of Her Late Majesty's "Green Canopy" project.

I discussed diversionary tactics and options with the local Neighbourhood officers as "nothing to do" was the standard response from youths even though sports and other activities are available in the local area. We also talked about reaching out to local sports clubs (boxing,

football, tennis), and we have contacted Leicester City's Community Outreach Team.



## RURAL POLICING TEAM IN SITU

People living in the rural parts of Harborough will be pleased to learn that the Rural Policing Team now has eight officers dedicated to supporting and protecting our rural communities.

One of my Police and Crime Plan's key pledges was to ask the Chief Constable to dedicate Rural Crime Teams to our rural areas of

Supported by the local neighbourhood and response teams, they are also equipped with vehicles suitable for the rural terrain!
