Foreword

As your Police and Crime Commissioner, my responsibility is to ensure that policing across Leicester, Leicestershire and Rutland remains effective, resilient and able to meet the needs of our communities, while being mindful of the financial pressures facing local residents.

The policing precept is the portion of the overall council tax that goes towards policing. When setting the precept for 2026/27, I worked hard to keep any increase as low as possible. I am very conscious that many households continue to face rising costs, and my clear starting point was to limit the impact on council taxpayers wherever I could.

Despite these efforts, members of the Police and Crime Panel were clear that residents in their wards across Leicester, Leicestershire and Rutland were willing to contribute more in order to protect local policing services. Having carefully considered this view alongside professional advice from Leicestershire Police about the financial and operational

challenges they face, I have decided to set the Council Tax Precept for the 2026/27 financial year at £15 per year for a Band D property.

This decision will ensure that Leicestershire Police can continue to respond effectively to demand, maintain visible frontline policing and provide vital support to victims of crime. It also strengthens my office's continued investment in prevention and community safety, helping to reduce crime and demand over time by supporting early intervention, protecting the most vulnerable and easing pressure on officers and staff.

While my preference was always to keep increases to a minimum, this approach will provide stability for Leicestershire Police. My commitment to scrutinising every aspect of police spending remains steadfast, and I will continue to ensure that public money is used efficiently, transparently and in the best interests of all our communities.

Budget for Policing Leicester, Leicestershire and Rutland 2026/27

The budget for 2026-27 has been set at £268.9m which is an increase of £14.4m (5.6%) from 2025-26.

Funding for policing comes from a combination of Central Government, Council Tax and grant income. For 2026-27 the Government provides 56% of the budget figure and 44% comes from local taxpayers. This means the amount of council tax a Band D property will pay towards policing will increase by 29p per week.
